Leading Learning Conversations: Conversation Contexts for Impact

Conversation is the medium through which leadership is lived out in schools and a 'coaching approach' has emerged as a highly effective way of leading in these complex human-intensive organisations. Regardless of organisational structure or prevailing policy framework; influence, learning, and progress happen through conversation. Fundamentally, change is enabled or inhibited by *how* we talk, and *what* we talk about, in the myriad of conversation contexts that present themselves throughout the school day.

The 'Learning Conversations Map' proposes a way of representing and organising the range of contexts where a 'conversation leader' may intentionally support the *learning* of another through conversation. This keynote presentation will introduce the four quadrants of the Learning Conversations Map: Formal Coaching Conversations; Review and Development Conversations; Leader-initiated Conversations; and Other-initiated (in-the-moment) Conversations.

Delegates will be invited to consider their own learning conversation contexts.

2A Eliciting Positive Emotions in Coaching Conversations: Practical Strategies Christian van Nieuwerburgh

In this interactive workshop, participants will have the opportunity to learn practical strategies from the field of positive psychology that can be integrated in coaching conversations. Strengths spotting, connecting to meaning and focusing on positives will be explored. Clients who experience positive emotions are more likely to feel better and think more creatively.

2B Students Coaching Students: Developing the Whole Child Mark Keenan and Steve Harper-Travers, Maraetai Beach School

Mark and Steve will share their school coaching journey over the past five years on developing and implementing a student coaching student programme that develops the whole child. The workshop will focus on what to consider when deciding to set up a student coaching student programme, what this can look like in practice and the successes and challenges they have experienced along the way.

Students will model a coaching conversation and participants will have time to reflect on what is happening in their own setting and begin to complete a plan of action for implementing student coaching in their schools.

2C Maximising impact using a coaching approach across Kahui Ako Roween Higgie and Julie Schumacher, The Education Group

Suitable for all leadership including KA Lead Principals and Support Principles, Across School and In-School Leaders.

In this workshop Roween and Julie will share their work and outline how leadership coaching has benefitted six Kāhui Ako all with individual contexts and achievement challenges.

You will hear how GCNZ Coaching has assisted each Kāhui to work collaboratively at all stages of the strategic plan development from the initial setting up of relationships through to measuring the impact of their development and the outcomes for students.

Participants will complete our coaching rubric to provide an understanding of where their Kāhui Ako is at in terms of establishing a leadership coaching approach and will then identify key next steps and conversations that need to occur within their Kahui Ako.

3D Using Coaching to Improve Transitions Between Kura Alexandra Sergeant and Rachel Thornton, Whangārei Boys' High School

Venue: members Lounge

Navigating the vast landscape of a large secondary school can be both a challenge and a reward, yet for some students, a sense of disconnect may overshadow their experience. Recognising the need to support student well-being during this critical time, some across school teachers embarked on a mission to explore innovative solutions. In 2020, a pilot programme was launched, aimed at bringing together Year 10 students from a local secondary school with Year 6 students. The results were remarkable. The younger students had the opportunity to connect with their older counterparts, fostering relationships that extended beyond the classroom. Meanwhile, the secondary school students embraced leadership roles, providing guidance and support to their younger peers. However, there was a need to provide more structured training and support for the year 10 students, bridging the gap between different levels of education.

In 2022, an improved transition programme was launched, targeting Year 9 students exhibiting leadership potential and positive traits. Around 20 students became the inaugural coaches and were trained in using the GROWTH framework. In 2023, these student coaches collaborated with Year 6 students from feeder schools facing transition challenges. The programme included relationship-building sessions, school visits, and coaching throughout Terms 1 to 3, culminating in a celebration day. The connections will extend into 2024, with Year 11 student coaches continuing coaching sessions with Year 7 coaches. Positive feedback from students and staff has prompted programme expansion for all year groups. While the success of these transitions will be realised in 2026, early signs and data suggest the programme's effectiveness. This presentation will detail the programme's structure, share insights from participants, and provide practical ideas for implementation in your school.



'Showing Up Stronger'
